Missions and Service Coordinator Pat Reed

Taken from an article in International Ministries newsletter. It emphasizes the cost of being a global servant.

After 20 years as IM missionaries, **David and Joyce Reed** have taken on the position of Global Coordinators of Spiritual Care. The position of spiritual care models how to walk with global servants on a daily basis so they thrive for the long-haul. Cross cultural stress stems from a variety of sources: cultural fatigue, burnout, trauma, historical views of mission, managing international partnerships, the constant demand of funding and unexpected events like a global pandemic. The goal is to provide tools that allow global servants to navigate these stressors with enhanced self-awareness so that self-care, soul care, and community care are amplified and life with God deepens.

The stress of constantly managing another climate, a new diet, new language and customs, new friendships, ministering with national partners, rewires the brain to accept these as normal. Throw in unexpected illness, accident, natural disaster, and the stress is amplified.

Joyce and David's ministry focus is to assist global servants in maintaining healthy boundaries. They have discovered that by simply bearing witness to their colleagues' pain, grief, struggles, and exhaustion, they build trust, authentic relationships and give them the courage not to give up. The Reeds' therefore offer spiritual guidance, workshops, and retreats. They walk through significant times of transition, transformation, grief, and loss. They mentor new global servants during their first years of cross-cultural ministry.

Why is this important? When global servants are self-regulated and grounded in Christ, then they can lead other with grace, humility, and joy. Ministry flows from a genuine life-giving well that draws others to God's love and mercy.



Our Benton Legacy cabin, with special needs accessible rooms and bathrooms, will give someone like Carol, or any special needs child, a way to experience camp without fear or worry that they will miss an activity or miss the fun of camp. Currently, we have raised \$4500 of our \$15,000 goal. We would love to go over and above our goal to provide a wonderful camping experience for all kids and adults.

"Peter knocked at the outer entrance, and a servant named Rhoda came to answer the door. When she recognized Peter's voice, she was so overjoyed she ran back without opening it an exclaimed, 'Peter is at the door'." Acts 12:13-14 One of my favorite scriptures is that of Peter's release from prison, being led out to the city, and going to Mary's house in Acts 12:1-17. In the afternoon we had a delightful music presentation by two local musicians: Rachel Cocar on the Clavanova and Jim Miller on the Keyboard. Sharon Farral gave the closing worship by portraying Mary Magdalene taking a walk and sharing her love of Christ. Her portrayal was very impressive and brought tears to our eyes.





We are looking forward to this year's Spring Spiritual Feast on Saturday April 30th at Elgin First Baptist Church beginning at 9:30 am when we will have a light breakfast before the meeting begins at 10:00 am. Our speaker will be Renee Edsall, Fox Valley Christian Action Development Coordinator. She will give us an update on the various programs they have for children and adults at the camp and in the communities around Kane County. Each church will provide a salad and dessert for the luncheon ending the day with a musical program.
